Message from the Founder and Executive Director

Thanks to the phenomenal support and generosity of our growing circle of friends in the community, the Academy made remarkable progress in 2012, achieving all of its stated goals while advancing in other exciting and unexpected ways as well.

As a result, over the course of its second year of operation, the Academy not only met all the requirements and organizational needs of a startup non-profit, it also set the stage for making a truly transformational impact on the public's understanding and the medical community's acceptance of warm water therapy as an effective treatment for individuals facing a range of medical and other challenges.



Among the milestones in 2012, our Academy launched its Pilot Apprentice Training (PAT) program, enrolling and awarding scholarships to five outstanding students who embody the values and fortitude required of our graduates. All five successfully completed the program and are now licensed, credentialed Aquatic Bodywork Practitioners ambitiously spreading the experience of warm water therapy throughout the San Diego community and beyond.

With the PAT program in full swing, the Academy was able to begin making warm water therapy available to individuals with special needs who could not afford treatment on their own. Among them were military personnel returning from Iraq and Afghanistan and suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Preliminary results were so positive that the Academy is mobilizing to conduct and complete a major case study in 2013. This research represents the Academy's greatest priority in the year ahead, and we will devote a major share of our energy and resources toward this effort.

Over the past year, we also provided warm water therapy to end-of-life patients and their caregivers. In light of the promising results, the Academy is exploring a possible partnership with the healthcare community to greatly expand treatments for such patients in the future. We look forward to continuing the dialogue in the months ahead.

As we look back on the Academy's achievements over the past year, it's important to note that this progress has its roots in the bold vision and hard work of the legendary men and women who created the five different and distinct applications that are combined in the Academy's warm water regimen. Mindful of this, we wish to acknowledge the core founders of these ever-evolving water treatment expressions. They are Harold Dull, creator of WATSU®, Theri Thomas, Aquaternatives®, Peggy Schoedinger P.T. the originator of Adaptive WATSU®, Alexander George, the creator of Healing Dance® and WaterDance, developed in 1987 in Switzerland by Arjana C. Brunschwiler (psychotherapist) and Peter Schröter (psychologist).

Looking closer to home, our achievements over the past year were made possible by our advisors, board members, donors and other friends in the community, many of whom are recognized with deep appreciation in this report. The outstanding generosity of our donors in 2012 resulted in a 300% increase in private gift and grant support over 2011. Our Mission

The Wave Academy is a not-for-profit (501c3) organization dedicated to expanding the role of warm water therapy as a powerful tool in the healing and advancement of individuals, communities and the human condition.

Our Objectives

To accomplish our mission, the Wave Academy:

- Supports and conducts research on the transformative and healing benefits of warm water therapy and educates
 the public about these benefits.
- Provides scholarships that enable individuals with merit and financial need to become credentialed warm water therapists.
- Provides financial assistance to special needs individuals who stand to gain the most from warm water therapy but are unable to afford treatment on their own.

Our longer-term objective is to establish the nation's first learning center for aquatic therapy, with its campus to be built in San Diego. This first-of-its-kind center will provide treatment, outsourced training by credentialed practitioners and ongoing analysis and assessment of healing and other benefits derived from warm water therapy.

Major 2012 Accomplishments

Launch of Pilot Apprentice Training Program and Provision of Scholarships

In 2012, the Academy launched its Pilot Apprentice Training (PAT) program, a rigorous one-year, 500-hour landand water-based curriculum and training regimen. Five outstanding and committed individuals enrolled in the course and completed their training, which included 50 hours of post-instruction apprenticeship. Today, all five are licensed and credentialed Aquatic Bodywork Practitioners, with hands-on experience and training in working with special needs populations.

The Academy is also proud to report that all five PAT students in 2012 were eligible to receive scholarship support, and thanks to the generosity of our donors, we were able to award such support to every one of them.

Improving Access to Warm Water Therapy

The Academy began making warm water therapy available to people who otherwise could not afford treatment. Grant funds targeted session costs, providing discounted rates and pro bono services to qualified individuals.

Exploring Partnership Opportunities to Treat End of Life Patients

Also in 2012, the Academy funded warm water treatments for end-of-life patients and their caregivers. Here, too, we saw enormous potential for wider benefit. As a result, the Academy has initiated discussions with healthcare providers about creating a partnership to greatly expand hospice patients' access to warm water treatment in 2013 and beyond. This would be the first partnership of its kind in the nation and would further establish warm water therapy as a bona fide medical treatment.

Major 2012 Accomplishments

Treating Military Personnel with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)

The Academy began providing warm water therapy to military veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), hypothesizing that warm water treatment would reduce their symptoms. Working with two PTSD volunteers over an 8-week period, we studied the effects of their treatment using the same widely recognized and standardized PTSD measurement tools applied by the U.S. military.

Preliminary results were extremely favorable and as a result, evaluation is now underway to study the impact of warm water therapy on 30-50 volunteer veterans clinically diagnosed with PTSD. The test will conclude in late August of 2013, and we are hopeful that the findings will enable the Academy to quickly expand and serve the greater San Diego county veteran population.



Major Support and Participation from the Community

Over the past year, the Academy benefited tremendously from the generosity, talent and experience of individuals serving on its Advisory Board and Board of Directors, in addition to other key donors and volunteers. Their commitment and dedication in 2012 were reflected in the following ways:

- In-kind support and professional expertise guided the creation of the Academy's first marketing video for potential clients and donors.
- In December, the Academy held its first outreach event to educate the philanthropic community about the benefits of warm water therapy and invite them to support the Academy's mission. Leading benefactors Donna and Erin O'Rourke co-hosted the intimate VIP event at Donna's breathtaking seaside home in La Jolla.
- Thanks to our friends in the community who opened their homes and pools to the Academy, our practitioners were able to serve more people and more communities, including San Diego, Palm Springs and Los Angeles.

Here are some examples of how your support can make a difference:

Such a gift will also make it possible for 50 men and women in uniform to enroll in – and possibly gain major benefit from – this major study.
