ETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends.

"I laughed for the first time this week," wrote one of our clients after a session of aquatic therapy. The client was working through a difficult time, which was compounded by his symptoms of Post-Traumatic Stress (PTS). These symptoms limit his ability to feel calm enough to enjoy the moment.

Wave Academy's program helps by addressing two key factors: the ability to feel calm and the ability to trust others. Clients tell us that the program is life changing and life affirming.

With your support our program is helping. Thank you!

In 2019, clients averaged a 22 percent reduction in PTS symptoms. This aligns with results from each of the past six years; we consistently see an average drop of 20-25 percent as a result of our 8-week program. This is helping to relieve the devastating symptoms associated with PTS.

Wave Academy's program is outcomes driven, scientifically measurable and includes strong protocols to deliver a world-class treatment modality. Our aquatic therapy program, which began nine years ago, ensures that more veterans survive and thrive in spite of their PTS diagnosis.

This is important because the number of individuals and families struggling with PTS in our community is astonishing. According to the San Diego VA Healthcare, there are 25,000 veterans who have PTSD. There are many others, including active duty and retired military, who cope with undiagnosed symptoms. Their challenges not only affect themselves, but their family and community as well.

Today, we address this critical community need to help reverse the spiral of depression, isolation and suicide. We hope that every one of our clients will laugh again.

COMMUNITY NEED: Wave Academy was founded in 2010 to address the veteran suicide epidemic facing our nation. Throughout the last decade, up to 22 service members and veterans a day have lost their lives to suicide. San Diego County has the third-highest concentration of veterans in the nation, the highest proportion of active-duty service members in the country, and the highest rate of veteran suicide in all of California. Many military members and veterans have expressed dissatisfaction with traditional PTSD therapies and have expressed interest in alternative-therapy solutions. To confront all of these problems, Wave Academy has made our profound, warm-water therapy accessible to the military and veteran community of San Diego.

OUR MISSION: Wave Academy's mission is to help active-duty military and veterans heal from post-traumatic stress through our unique, research-based program of warm water therapy. Our service welcomes caregivers to support whole family wellness.

OUTPUTS: In 2019 Wave Academy served 133 clients in the water for our healing, transformational program. Each client participated in a research-based 8-week, 8-session program. The program is open to PTS-diagnosed active-duty military and veterans of all eras, regardless of discharge status. Qualified applicants receive Wave Academy's therapy at low-cost or no-cost to make this therapy accessible for low-to-moderate income applicants. Caregivers of service members or veterans enrolled in Wave Academy are also eligible for the therapeutic program.

OUTCOMES: In 2019 Wave Academy achieved a 22.2 percent average decrease in symptoms for its clients. Since its foundation Wave Academy has never lost a client to suicide. Year after year Wave Academy is able to report a 20 percent or higher annual average decrease in its clients PTS symptoms.

IMPACT: Aquatic bodywork therapy addresses PTSD symptoms such as trusting oneself and others, achieving a state of calm and relaxation, stress management, and acceptance. The Wave Academy program is designed to encourage individuals to make a transition from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder to a state of Post-Traumatic Growth by promoting virtues such as personal wellness, mindfulness, and resiliency. By providing our high-level healing modality of aquatic therapy, Wave Academy can make an impact on dropping the military and veteran suicide rate in San Diego to zero.

WAVES FOR THE BRAVE 5K

In 2019 Wave Academy held our second annual 5K trail-run and hike, the Waves for the Brave 5K at Lake Poway. This year's event featured live-music courtesy of The Roy Rockers. Eve Jack and the Ramona High School JROTC color-guard joined forces for a solemn national anthem and colors ceremony, and after the race, runners were treated to free Kombucha sampling thanks to Vida Kombucha. Although the weather was wet, the conditions for a great 5K and spreading Wave Academy's mission to the community couldn't have been more perfect. Waves for the Brave 5K raised \$18,246 in support of our healing, aquatic therapy.

WAVE ACADEMY SUMMER OPEN HOUSE

The 2019 Summer Open House event gave the opportunity for members of the healthcare. military, veteran, and caregiver communities to obtain a thorough understanding of the Wave Academy mission and what we do to achieve it. Aquatic bodywork therapy demonstrations were given by Wave Academy practitioners Cheryl Zolla and Tyson Bierwolf. Clients Norriah Mease and loseph Schramm spoke on how Wave Academy has affected them, and County Supervisor Kristin Gaspar's policy advisor Corrine Busta touched on Wave Academy's important role as a community partner.

WAVES OF SUPPORT DINNER

The 2019 Waves of Support Dinner brought together a gracious group of individuals for an intimate and unforgettable evening of exquisite food, remarkable stories, and charitable atmosphere. Clubhouse season passes from the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, four homeplate San Diego Padres tickets, and a four-pack of float sessions were auctioned off by our Board President Maggie Hannegan. Executive Director, Elizabeth Berg and Outreach and Communications Coordinator, Sean McGinty both gave their unique perspectives on how Wave Academy has affected them and their communities. The \$35,000 raised has been instrumental in providing our unique, effective therapy to the men and women who have served our nation.

NEW SOURCES OF SUPPORT: In 2019 both the Art Pratt Foundation of Old Mission Rotary and the USS Midway Foundation selected Wave Academy as a recipient of their grant programs. New corporate sponsorships gained in 2019 also helped underwrite the cost of our three events: The Waves for the Brave 5K, Summer Open House, and the Waves of Support Dinner.


VITAL NEW PARTNERSHIPS: Wave Academy obtained its first partnerships with active-duty military organizations in 2019 - The Overcoming Adversity and Stress Injury Support (OASIS) program at Naval Sub-Base San Diego and the Surf Clinic held by Navy Medical Center San Diego.

CLIENT INPUT COUNCIL: In October, Wave Academy staff invited a number of client-volunteers to a roundtable discussion focused on ways to improve Wave Academy's program from a client's perspective. Much of the data taken from this session was put to use in tailoring our post-program survey questions and in crafting additions to the program for 2020.

BY THE NUMBERS

- The total number of men and women served by Wave Academy's life-changing therapy, not including their loved ones who also benefit from their wellness outcomes.
- This was the average decrease in PTS symptoms between pre- and post-assessments achieved through the 8-session aquatic bodywork program.
- This is the number of sessions of our aquatic therapy program. Clients who complete all eight sessions are presented with a challenge coin to recognize their commitment.
- Wave Academy expanded its Board of Directors with three new members that contribute with their respective talents in legal matters, human resources, and insurance expertise.
- Wave Academy brought on two new staff members in order to help build capacity: Sean McGinty, Outreach and Communications Coordinator, and Chelsey Hinrichsen, Administrative Manager.

PARTICIPANT INFORMATION





The crux of the Wave Academy program is our highly-trained team of aquatic practitioners. To become certified as a Wave Academy practitioner an individual must first complete 500 hours of training to become a certified massage or physical therapist. This is followed by an additional 500 hours of aquatic training to become a licensed Watsu® Practitioner. Classes require an intensive, in-depth education into how a body may be manipulated in the water to release tension and deliberately maneuver a client's body to induce extreme relaxation, feelings of calm, and profound trust in the practitioner. Wave Academy's practitioners are multidisciplinary, and pursue additional training to expand their aquatic therapy skills and better understand military and veteran clients who have experienced trauma.

Wave Academy welcomes its first active-duty organizational partnership - In

March of 2019 Wave Academy was offered an opportunity to present its therapeutic program to the US Navy's Overcoming Adversity and Stress Injury Support (OASIS) comprehensive in-patient PTSD program at Naval Sub-Base Point Loma. The presentation was given to a combination of active-duty Navy medical officers and DoD civilian psychologists, followed by a panel of questions from the cohort about topics ranging from accessibility of pools to client safety precautions. Due to our program's years in service and tight procedural methodology, we were selected to become an additional therapy available to the men and women assigned to OASIS.

Partnering with the OASIS program represents Wave Academy's first foray into dealing directly with an active-duty Department of Defense organization to provide aquatic bodywork therapy to current service members. The OASIS program utilizes a host of traditional and holistic therapies to treat service members in need from all branches of service who come from any active military installation around the globe.



NEW PARTNERS HELP LINK WAVE ACADEMY TO CAREGIVERS

An important part of Wave Academy's mission is serving the caregivers of our military and veteran clients to promote whole family wellness. To better expand our reach to military and veteran caregivers, Wave Academy has been working with the Southern Caregiver Resource Center in San Diego County.

Wave Academy has worked alongside the SCRC at their "Strong Caregiver, Stronger Family" expo's geared toward military and veteran caregivers, and as co-presenters at the Navy Wounded Warrior Caregiver Expo at Balboa Hospital. Both Wave Academy and the SCRC are dedicated to helping caregivers and their families through their respective programs.

"Everyone is a caregiver for somebody," explained Jessica Romero, community educator at the Southern Caregiver Resource Center. "There are unique challenges for the caregivers for military families due to physical injuries or mental illnesses of the military lifestyle. That is why it is so important to have resources like Wave Academy available."
